A staged approach:

We are proud that behaviour and safety at Kings Worthy Primary school is outstanding. This judgement has been validated by external professionals e.g. a local authority inspector and an Ofsted inspector. The vast majority of our pupils are kind and polite; they delight in following our BEST rules.

Teachers are trained so that they skillfully enable children to develop positive relationships that lead to mutual respect and positive behaviour. Alongside rewards there is a need for sanctions so that pupils understand that there are consequences for inappropriate behaviour. At Kings Worthy we follow a staged approach to behaviour management. This enables the children opportunities to change the way they are behaving and make it the best it can be. Our staged approach is followed throughout the school day whether in the classroom or on the playground.

<u>Stage 1:</u> When behaviour (such as calling out, disrupting others and not being on task) occur children are given an initial verbal or visual warning. Most often this is all that is required.

Stage 2: In the infrequent occurrence of the warning being ignored or the behaviour repeated then the child may be moved on the class behaviour chart, given some time out or have their name on the board depending on the phase and class that they are in.

Stage 3: In rare cases, if the behaviour appears to be escalating, the child may be asked to leave the room or miss part or all of playtimes. At this stage the child's name and a record of the behaviour will be entered into the class behaviour diary. This stage may also result in a yellow letter being sent home.

<u>Stage 4:</u> In exceptional circumstances a pupil's behaviour may deteriorate further. At this stage the Head teacher or Deputy head will contact parents to look for ways to support the child and prevent further unacceptable behaviour.

Parents as Partners

Talk about the BEST promise at home with your child/children. See if they can tell you the different animals and what they stand for. Ask them to describe some of the behaviours the trying tortoise may have or even if they were like the successful squirrel this week.

A strong and supportive relationship between home and school can really help a child to understand how they should behave. Parents and school staff working together to clarify expectations regarding behaviour, including rewards and sanctions, can lead to a very positive outcome for all involved.

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Our Vision:


