Also, as stated last week, the school provision over Easter will not be learning and there have been **no online learning tasks** or feedback from the teachers.

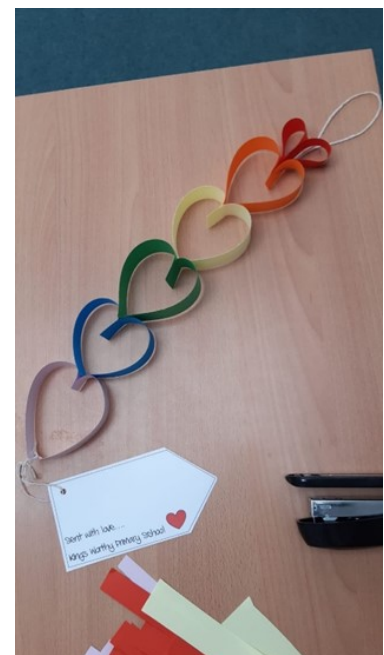
I would like to wish you all a very happy Easter and I hope you enjoy one or two cheeky chocolate eggs over the weekend.

Sponsor a duck

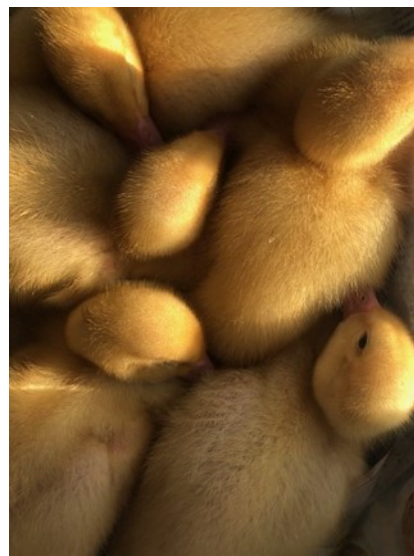
