Reading	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Read for at least twenty minutes each day. • Try one of the BBC bitesize daily bookclub lessons, such as the 'Attack of the Demon Dinner Ladies!' • Continue our work on 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' by Michael Morpurgo, see here for lesson 1 and lesson 2 for this week. • You might want to continue reading 'The Ickabog', read it on your own or with help from mummy and daddy (aimed at aged 7-9).
Spelling	<p>This week we will be revising using apostrophes for contractions, practice the supermovers dance then watch the Scratch garden video all about contractions. You could also look at the BBC lesson to learn more. Practice spelling the contractions using the handwriting and wordsearch challenge sheets.</p>
Writing	<p>This week we are using another film clip from The Literacy Shed website, it is a clip called Bubbles. A lonely young girl finds a bottle of magic bubbles and is taken on a magical adventure, at the end of the clip she spots another child who looks sad and lonely, so she leaves the bottle of bubbles for the other child to discover. Imagine you found the bottle of bubbles, we want you to write an adventure story about where the bubbles take you. What will you do with the magic bubbles when your adventure is over? Use the steps below to help you.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Think about where you might go – will it be to a real place or imaginary? Draw a picture of where you end up. Think about the shapes and colours you might see around you. • Complete the Oak National academy lessons to learn about setting descriptions and commas in a list and this BBC lesson on exclamation marks so that you can include these in your adventure story. • Edit your story, check your spellings and make sure your capital letters and punctuation are correct. Look at the words you have chosen, do you know what they mean? Try and use a thesaurus to up level your vocabulary choices. • Make a neat, final copy of your adventure story, you could do this in your book or have a go at making your own illustrated book, there's a format set as a 2do on Purple Mash.
Maths	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This week you will be learning about measuring temperature and capacity. Look in your kitchen at the bottles and cans of liquid in your fridge and cupboards, are the measurements in millilitres or litres? What do you notice about the sizes of the different containers? If you have a measuring jug in the kitchen explore pouring different amounts of water into the jug and use the jug to check the capacity of some of your different cups and glasses, how much water can fit in your favourite cup? Have you got a thermometer in your house or car? How warm is it? Keep a diary of the temperature each day this week, which day was hottest? Which was coolest? Try to check the temperature at a similar time each day e.g. midday to make it a fair test. • Complete the 5 lessons on Oak National Academy: lesson 1, lesson 2, lesson 3, lesson 4, lesson 5
Curriculum Task:	<p>Art: Following on from last week with our new topic all about Australia, we would like you to learn about Aboriginal art work. Watch this video to learn more then read the 2 information packs about aboriginal art work. We've also included lots of pictures you could use for inspiration. Complete the aboriginal art 2do on Purple Mash and have a go at making your own dot painting in the style of aboriginal art, using paint and cotton buds if you have them, or just pens/crayons and drawing dots. You could follow the steps to complete the sunshine dot painting, choose an Australian animal to paint or just invent a pattern of your own. Remember to stick to white, yellow, orange and red as the colours of the Earth. You might want to plan your painting out by drawing the outline faintly in pencil before you begin to add your dots of colour.</p>
