Throughout Covid we have shown that we can do this together with parents and carers. Annual Local Authority Visit – 17.2.22

Each year the school is subject to the local authority conducting a leadership and learning review of the school. The chief aim of the process is to enable a school's on-going improvement through the provision of external challenge and support.

Some of the things on the agenda included: impact of SEND provision; impact of the school's inclusive practice on pupil outcomes; the extent to which task design can improve the outcomes in maths for all pupils from their starting points.

The day went very well and it was agreed that we have sufficient capacity for sustaining our current performance due to the fact that we have identified clear priorities for the school going forward.

Some of the comments in the final written report included:

- All safeguarding procedures are in good order.
- In phonics lessons there is consistency across the year groups with a variety of challenge.
- Pupils know the structure of the phonics sessions and were very excited about their learning.
- In year 2 the handwriting of the children was exceptional and it was an excellent learning environment.
- In key stage 2 all the maths learning observed clearly demonstrated the work the school has been completing on problem solving.
- Where practice is strongest teachers are using:
 - Instructions (explanations) which are clear and concise
 - Good use of the working wall (displays in class) consistently referring to prior learning (teacher and Pupils)
 - Clear links from the sounds across Key Stage 1 to pupils writing in their tasks (phonics)
 - Support staff who were active in the classroom and supporting the teacher with behaviour management
 - Excellent behaviours for learning and environment
 - Good use of interventions from the support staff and teachers with pupils requiring extra support

Actions for us to work on:

- Develop and embed improvements to teaching and learning strategies, which includes variation to challenge greater depth learning and scaffolding and task design so that it is inclusive of all pupils and leads to improved outcomes.
- Embed monitoring, evaluation, and reviewing (alongside) with subject leaders so that they develop their judgements of teaching and learning across the school.

Frustratingly, I am still waiting to receive the report from our recent Ofsted inspection, and as soon as it is available to share with all of you it will be the first thing I do.




Farewell...and Hello
