


The children will be doing gymnastics in PE, learning a variety of shapes and movements every Friday.

Phonics

We began last term by focussing on environmental and instrumental sounds, rhythm and rhyme, body percussion and learnt all of our Level 2 sounds which enabled us to orally blend and segment words containing these letters. This term, we will begin by consolidating what they have learnt in the autumn term, looking at traditional tales, such as Little Red Riding Hood, and thinking about initial sounds in words and alliteration, as well as rhyming. Then, we will be moving on to the Level 3 sounds, where the children will be learning the final letters in the alphabet, more digraphs and will be introduced to trigraphs. This will enable them to develop their blending and segmenting skills to support their reading and writing.

A simple rhyme to remember in support of your child's pencil grip is, nip, flip and grip.



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Maths

The children will consolidate and continue to build on their knowledge of numbers to 10, subitising (see below) these quickly and continuing to practise counting patterns. They will also be looking at shape and pattern and learning to recognise and compare common shapes such as circles, rectangles, triangles and squares. Once the children are confident with their numbers to 10, they will start to compare numbers and investigate all the different ways they can make 10. Quick recall of all number facts within 10 is highly beneficial for children's maths so any support you can give them with this at home is very useful.

Writing

This term we have planned in lots of writing activities including label writing, practising writing our names without a guide, telling stories and writing recipes. Please upload any writing your child does at home to Tapestry as it really does help our assessments.

> Subitising in Maths is when you are able to look at a group of objects and realise how many there are without counting.
